Because governments are the ones to develop and implement most actions that will help end violence against children, Najat works closely with them. She supports and visits them to work hand in hand with the Government, the different national institutions, the United Nations, and children themselves.

She also works closely with civil society, like non-profit organizations or volunteer groups, helping them to connect to each other and to other partners, and supporting them in their work to end violence.

Most importantly, Najat engages with children.






HOW DOES THE CLIMATE CRISIS HARM CHILDREN?

The climate crisis is one of the major global threats of our times, and children like you have been alerting the world for years.

We hear you, and we are joining our voices to yours: we need to act NOW, fast and efficiently to save our planet.

The world is facing a climate crisis. Although the climate is always changing, this time it's different: Human activity is causing changes in the atmosphere, the land and the ocean, and triggering:



Children like you were the first ones to warn the world, that:




Have you experienced the effects of climate change in your city, town, or village?

Some children think that it doesn't affect them, but a study done by **UNICEF**¹ told us that the majority of children experience weather and other consequences caused by climate change and environmental degradation.

In fact, **1 billion children** - that is almost half of the children in the world - are at very high risk of the impacts of the climate crisis, as you can see in this map.

AND HOW DOES THE CLIMATE CRISIS HARM CHILDREN? WHAT IS THE CONNECTION TO VIOLENCE?

As children have been telling the world, the climate crisis is not only about the environment, but it also AFFECTS PEOPLE. Especially them.



When the climate crisis is also combined with other existing factors (like poverty, food insecurity, conflicts and wars, social inequalities and humanitarian crises), it can increase or worsen violence against children.

LET'S SEE HOW:

Differente natural (and not natural) disasters are the result of climate change.
For example:











These disasters affect families and communities in different ways, which can lead to children being at risk of experiencing violence.

For example:

Families may decide to pull their children out of school because they can't afford it. And when children's education is interrupted, they are more likely to be victims of violence, including being sent to work to support the family, or even have girls get married.



Families may decide to move from the place where they live because their living conditions have been affected by the disaster. Moving to live somewhere else is called displacement. And displaced children are more likely to be separated from their families and become victims of various forms of violence at all stages of their journey.

In 2020, disasters - including storms and flooding - triggered three times more internal displacement than violent conflicts.



When climate and environmental disasters happen, women and girls are among the most affected, and are more exposed to violence. Because of their traditional roles, they may have to fetch water from farther away, forced to work for others doing house chores, or even be married, or be trafficked and/or sexually abused or exploited.



Not having enough access to water or food, can cause conflict and violence.





The climate crisis also affects children's mental health, as they can feel constantly worried, anxious and nervous about the future because of the climate crisis.

Have you ever felt like this?

"When I'm taking action, I don't feel like I am helpless and that things are hopeless, because then I feel like I'm doing everything I can(...). Children are standing out as environmental and human rights defenders and the adult world should continue to empower them and follow their lead. They are increasingly using the justice system as a powerful tool to address climate (what we call climate justice). Adolescents and youth led a lawsuit against the United States on how their rights have been affected because of the climate crisis, mobilizing over 32,000 young people.

In the United Arab Emirates, two teenage siblings started a PEPC campaign (Papers, E-wastes, Plastics and Cans) and are mobilizing their school, peers, and parents, collecting approximately 15,000kgs of waste every month.

> In Colombia, a group of 25 children and youth came together to create the first lawsuit in Latin America on climate change and future generations. And they won! The Court ordered the protection of the Colombian Amazon

In Uganda, children and young people repurpose used water bottles as containers for homemade liquid soap which they sell to help support their families. Through this youthled initiative, children have been empowered to take matters into their own hands to help address climate action, so when there were too many bottles for the small liquid soap business, they came up with the idea of selling the used water bottles to recycling companies.

Recognizing that indigenous people are disproportionately on the front lines of the climate crisis, in Australia, teenage students united to create one of the biggest movements in the history of the country - Schoolstrike4climate - to demand decision makers to treat climate change as a crisis.

In 2012 in Peru, seven-years old José created the first bank for children 'Eco Banco del Estudiante', which turns trash children find on the streets into money. The bank now has more than

6,000 members aged 10 to 18.

Having identified rising sea levels as a problem, in Fiji, children and youth have developed a climate-smart solution to coastal erosion, planting and maintaining mangrove trees to allow the coast to recover.



By placing children at the center of responses

Many political commitments are addressing the climate crisis. But they often don't take into account children, who **must not be forgotten**.



By investing enough resources in child sensitive policies, legislation, programs and actions.

Policies and legislations need to be child sensitive. The lack of investment in children cannot be justified.



By engaging companies in the response and making them accountable


Companies (including those exploiting oil, gas and mines, those involved in deforestation, and in large amounts of meat production) have a very important responsibility and role to play in addressing the climate crisis, especially because businesses have been the source of environmental damage that impacts the climate and children's wellbeing. They must be part of the solution by changing their production methods and mitigating their impact on the climate to protect children.

By encouraging cooperation between countries

The climate crisis affects countries in different ways. It's common that the ones who are at greater risk are those who are the least responsible for the climate crisis. Countries need to work with one another.



By involving children as key actors of change











Strengthen children's capacities on climate adaptation and mitigation.

Invest in education on climate change and the environment.

Equip children to be part of the solution.









"We, the children demand for urgent action and solutions to climate change. We are the most affected yet least responsible for climate change. We also need to be included or consulted when coming up with the solutions. When we are included, we learn more and in our own small way are able to take action and engage in activities that address climate change like proper disposal of garbage and planting trees."

KEY MESSAGES

We have no time to lose to achieve a safe, inclusive and healthy world. That is why I would like to leave you with the following key messages, which I have also shared with decision makers in my report.



Too many children are already being left behind, and the climate crisis is aggravating this. No country is immune and no child is immune. It is urgent to act, and to place children at the center of the response.



Solutions need to come from a new angle: with collaboration between all sectors, and placing children and women at the center.



More investment in children is needed to build safe, just, inclusive and resilient societies, for and with children. **Children and young people MUST be involved in all stages** of identifying and implementing the solutions.

"Our climate and environment play a very important role in our lives. I want people to understand that the change of climate does not only affect our lives, but our future generations' too. If you stand up together, and put in the effort to make a change, then the environment will thank you. It promises you the freshest air and the purest water, the tallest mountains and the freshest trees. then we must also show our responsibility and promise the restoration of the environment. If we put the effort into it, we can do it. Anything is possible."
